Message from the Executive Director



A range of emotion arises as I write this message, my last in the role of Executive Director, as I am resigning from this position—by design!—at the end of 2019. I will continue to serve NKOE as trainer, facilitator, speaker, and helper with special events and am excited about new leadership taking NKOE to the next level!

I grew my vision to where NKOE will benefit now with a new and experienced director with a different skill set from mine. Letting go is bittersweet: sadness arises with the letting go, as does happiness because of how much NKOE has grown, and excitement because I know the next executive director will lead NKOE further along its creative and dynamic trajectory!

Last year NKOE ran 8 groups in 5 schools, several of them yearlong, as well as an evening group. Those schools want this program you made possible again this year, and the evening group has split into two groups: one for Littles (ages 3-7) and one for older keiki/teens and their adults.

Grace surrounds NKOE and continues to astound me—you amazing people volunteer in varying capacities, expertise appears when needed, and more and more people hear about us. The challenge of educating the public as to the critical importance of addressing children's grief continues, however. Children are resilient—BUT **not** in a vacuum, and **thanks to you**, NKOE provides the safe space where keiki and teens can heal.

Volunteer Superstar!

Co-program director Susan G. Brown has been an integral part of Na Keiki O Emalia's development from its inception. Her career in understanding grief began in 1985 when she was a founding board member of Hospice Maui and later employed for 10 years as the patient care coordinator.

Once again, Susan has been active at the foundational level of an organization centered around helping grieving individuals and families and benefits NKOE with her experience.

In 2016 Donna Schuurman, then the director and senior trainer at The Dougy Center in Portland, Oregon, trained Susan, Wendy Milovina, and Brooke Brown so they could train NKOE volunteers to facilitate the peer support groups. Since then, Susan has been active in shaping and conducting the trainings and has facilitated many of the school groups.



Originally, from Oahu, Susan moved to Maui 50 years ago. She has three adult children and is now a semi-retired counselor. When she is not busy helping her 98-year-old mother, she enjoys mahjong and travelling with her husband to third-world countries where she explores neighborhoods.
